Anesthesiologist

- is a medical doctor who specializes in administering anesthesia, the medical treatment that keeps you from feeling pain during procedures or surgery.
- Anesthesiologists take care of you before, during and after your surgery.

Conversation between an Anesthesiologist and a Patient

- **Patient:** Doctor what are you doing? Why are you giving injection to the spinal cord?
- **Doctor :** I never told you that I am injecting anesthesia to the spinal cord. Who gave you this wrong information?
- **Patient :** The reason is that my sister was injected multiple time on her spine for anesthesia during her cesarean section. That's why I think she still has her back pain.
- **Doctor:** I Agree that multiple injections are taken for anesthesia but I too have a back ache and I have never taken any anesthesia.
- **Patient:** So then Doctor, isn't back pain due to such anesthetic injections?

- **Doctor:** From conception till delivery during pregnancy, spinal bone carries the weight of baby which can cause lumbar lordships or the spine bending. Probability of such cases are more for those who bend to work often and with those who are overweight and obese
- **Patient** Doctor can you give me a full body anesthesia, then I won't feel anything.

The Past Simple Tense

- The past simple tense is used to describe completed actions or events that occurred at a specific time in the past.
- The past simple tense is usually formed by adding the suffix –ed to regular verbs. However, irregular verbs have their own unique past tense forms. here's the basic structure:
- Regular verbs: base form+ ed
 - Walk – walked
 - Play – played
 - Talk – talked
- Irregular verbs: verbs that do not follow the regular- ed pattern . They have unique past tense forms.
- go – went
- Eat – ate
- Buy – bought

Affirmative

- The affirmative form of the past simple tense is used to express actions or events that happen in the past at a specific time.

• Subject	Verb + d, ed, ied or irregular form (V2)	Rest of Sentence
-----------	--	------------------

- I walked to the shop yesterday.
- They slept late last Saturday.

Negative

- The negative form of the past simple tense is used to express actions or events that did not happen in the past.
- To form the negative past simple tense, we use the auxiliary verb "did" (in its past tense form) followed by "not" (contracted to didn't) and the base form of the main verb.
- S+ did+ not+ base form of the verb
- I didn't walk to school yesterday.
- She didn't play tennis last weekend.
- He didn't go to the party on Friday.
- We didn't see that movie last night .

Question

- The question form of the past simple tense is used to unique about actions or events that happened at a specific time in the past.
- To form the questions in the past simple tense, we use the auxiliary verb “did” (in its past tense form) followed by the subject and the base form of the main verb.
- Did+ subject+ base form of the verb.
- Did you walk to school yesterday?
- Did she play tennis last weekend?
- Did he go to the party on Friday?
- Did we see that movie last night
