Future Tenses

There are four future tense forms:

- 1. Simple future tense
- 2. The future continuous tense
- 3. The future perfect tense
- 4. The future perfect continuous
- (1) **Simple Future Tense** is used to refer to an action which will happen in the future. It's used to talk about things that haven't happened yet. This means it talks about an action or condition that will **begin** and **end** in the **future**.

It is formed using will /shall + the base verb.

They will play football in that field.

Ali **will go** to the library tomorrow.

I will write articles on different topics.

• (2) **The Future Continuous Tense** is used to refer to an action will happen in the future and continue for an expected length of time. It is formed using the construction

will

 be $+$ verb $+$ -ing).

He will be planning about his studies.

I will be playing tennis at 10 tomorrow.

They will be making preparation for their exams.

• (3) The Future Perfect Tense is only used in <u>a few situations</u>. It refers to <u>a completed action</u> in the future. It is most often used with <u>a time expression</u>. It is formed using the construction:

By six tonight I will have finished this book.

By this time next week she will have cooked dinner.

By next year you will have studied the English tenses.

• (4) Future Perfect Continuous Tense is used to refer to an action will continue up until a point in the future. It is formed using the construction:

$$will + have + been + v + - ing$$
