



Introduction of Nursing

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Introduction:

Nurses are essential and vital to the sustainability and effectiveness of our healthcare system for many reasons. Nursing is a helping profession that assists individuals and groups in society to attain, maintain, and restore health. If this is not possible, nurses help individuals die with dignity. Nursing is perceiving, thinking, relating, judging, and acting with the behaviour of individuals who come to a nursing situation.

History of nursing:

Florence Nightingale laid the foundations of professional nursing after the Crimean War. Nightingale believed that nursing was a social freedom and mission for women. She believed that any educated woman can help improve the care of the medically sick. Her *Notes on Nursing* (1859) became popular. Nightingale model of professional education, having set up one of the first schools of nursing that is connected to a continuously operating hospital and medical school, spread widely in Europe and North America.



Nursing:

is a profession within the <u>healthcare</u> sector focused on the care of individuals, families, and communities so they may attain, maintain, or recover optimal health and <u>quality of life</u>.

Nurses develop a plan of care, working collaboratively with physicians, therapists, the patient, the patient's family, and other team members that focuses on treating illness to improve quality of life.

Nurses may help coordinate the patient care performed by other members of a multidisciplinary healthcare team such as therapists, medical practitioners, and dietitians. Nurses provide care both interdependently, for example, with physicians, and independently as nursing professionals. In addition to providing care and support, nurses educate the public and promote health and wellness

Nurse definition:

is person who cares for the sick or infirm *specifically*: a licensed health care professional who practices independently or is supervised by a physician, surgeon, or dentist and who is skilled in promoting and maintaining health

Health: is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity.

Hospital: is an institution providing medical and surgical treatment and nursing care for sick or injured people.

Some of the tasks, duties, and responsibilities of nurses:

- •Listening to and educating patients and their families.
- •Preparing patients for clinical exams.
- •Recording patients' medical histories.
- Collecting samples.
- Using medical equipment to diagnose and treat patients under the supervision of physicians.
- Assisting with managing and navigating a patient's care.



Nurses work in state, local, and private hospitals, ambulatory healthcare service centers, nursing and residential care facilities, government offices and agencies, and educational services.

Specialties and practice settings:

Nursing is the most diverse of all health care professions.

Nurses practice in a wide range of settings but generally nursing is divided depending on the needs of the person being nursed.
